To vaccinate or not to vaccinate?

The issue of vaccination is a tricky one, and one of the difficult decisions that have to be made by the ECS Management Committee when they meet at the end of September.

We have been instructed by our Child and Family Services funder, NSW Department of Communities and Justice, that we must have a Vaccination Policy which, among other things, ensures that all our workforce are fully vaccinated. Of course, we also have to consider the health and safety of our vulnerable Aged Services clients. We have the QR Code and sign-in processes already in place as part of our COVID Plan, but the next thing is what to do about requiring proof of vaccination.

Please know that we have an absolute commitment to serving the community and helping people in need, and the Vaccination Policy will be the result of weighing up the health advice and instructions from



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our three government funders, as well as the conversations we've been having with clients during lockdown.

It's important that visitors to ECS understand this is likely to affect how you enter the building and the questions you will be asked before using ECS services. Please call me if you have concerns; and know that ECS Team members will not be exercising their personal views - paid staff and unpaid volunteers must follow all policies issued by the management committee.


Birthday Fun fact #14

ECS is the Secretariat for a working group of local inhome and community aged care providers called the Collaborative Against Abuse of Older People in Sutherland Shire, and Amalia is our artist!

At just 12 years old, Amalia has begun her community service at a young age by producing a series of drawings for a social media campaign to help victims of elder abuse. She was introduced to the Collaborative when her mum, Sia, answered a Facebook ad for pro bono artists by Collaborative Chairperson, Mel Paterson.

"I have to admit that I was a little sceptical about involving someone so young. Abuse of older people is a tough topic to discuss, let alone pictorialise, but Amalia's artwork is just what we needed to start the conversation. It is mature and bold, just like her!"

Amalia's four drawings have featured in a series of social media posts on Facebook and emails to community leaders in Sutherland Shire.
